75th Annual UOL Convention - hosted by Sts. Peter and Paul UOL Chapter in Carnegie, PA



The 75th UOL Convention was memorable for so many reasons! We had not joined together for two years and sponsored virtual Conventions rather than gather together. Our Carnegie chapter has been preparing for several years and they are to be commended for planning a Convention that was fantastic! The UOL Convention started on Wednesday July 27, 2022 and UOL members gathered at the Double Tree Hotel outside Carnegie. It was a wonderful time for delegates and guests from chapters and parishes throughout the country to gather, enjoy each other and also discuss issues of critical importance to our Church.

Over the course of the convention approximately 150 faithful and clergy gathered for meetings and wonderful social events. His Eminence Metropolitan Antony and His Eminence Archbishop Daniel actively took part in all aspects of the Convention. It was wonderful to come to the UOL Convention and to be greeted by two smiling faces, registration committee members Alice Sivulich and Cindy Haluszczak. The registration committee welcomed every individual with a packet of UOL materials. The registration committee also chaired a fantastic basket raffle with over two dozen beautiful baskets. The basket raffle has become a lovely way for chapters to assist with convention fundraising.

While the Senior and Junior Executive Boards had meetings the Convention committee set up a wonderful shop with items, including books, religious items, Ukrainian embroidery and other cultural items for sale the entire Convention. Fr. Deacon Evan O'Neil also set up a wonderful interactive display from 75 years of Convention memorabilia. The convention committee had collected multiple convention yearbooks that delegates and guests reviewed during their free time.

The first business session of the Convention was called to order that evening by President Karen Ferraro. As always the Convention started with prayer and the Invocation offered by His Eminence Metropolitan Antony. The Convention body then pledged allegiance to the flag and sang the National Anthem.

Opening remarks and greetings were given by President Karen Ferraro, Junior UOL President Natalie Hrytsay, Convention Committee Chairperson Tracey Sally, and the Spiritual Father of the Convention, Fr. John Charest. While many of the events were similar from previous Conventions, this year each event had special meaning because we had not joined together for several years. The first formal session of the day concluded with the approval of a formal Agenda, Minutes, Financial Records and Audit Reports.

That evening the entire convention body enjoyed a hospitality room with snacks and pizza. While the food was delicious, more important than any meals, was the time to greet each other. It was a joy to catch up with fellow UOL members and to enjoy each other's company. It was a time to catch up with old friends and rekindle UOL bonds.

The second day of this year's Convention began with a Divine Liturgy that with the blessing of His Eminence Metropolitan Antony was served by His Eminence Archbishop Daniel. It was the feast day of St. Volodymyr and His Eminence shared an inspiring reflection about St. Volodymyr's legacy.

Following Divine Liturgy everyone enjoyed a fantastic brunch. Following brunch the sessions resumed and our keynote speaker, Fr. John Chakos of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church, spoke about his missionary work in Guatemala.

75th UOL Discussion Breakout Session Summary

During the Business Sessions, the 75th UOL Convention Delegates had several breakout sessions on the following topics: UOL Strategic Plan; Focus on Youth; and Ukrainian Refugees Support. The delegates stayed in the same groups for both sessions which allowed for deeper discussion and recommendations for the UOL NEB for the upcoming years. Representatives presented information to the convention body for discussion and a summary follows and will also be available on the UOL Website.

UOL Strategic Plan Session

Having a strategy is always a good idea, and part of that strategy is to determine the Ends, Ways, and Means of achieving the goal or the desired end. The desired **end or goal** is to Demonstrate Our (the UOL's) Value to the UOC of USA (parishes/parishioners).

We can do this by leveraging the UOL's unique capabilities and interconnections and building bridges with different parishes/people instead of everyone standing alone as islands.

We can connect everyone to the Church.

The UOL can show the value of connecting people and parishes. The concept addresses the entire archdiocese, not just UOL Parishes.

Recommendation: Show the value of the UOL as an organization that connects among different parishes of the UOC of USA to help solve their common problems or share ideas.

Examples of common problems can range from new issues that may arise like the War in Ukraine. The UOL could be a source or way to share information to everyone, what kinds of problems/issues are people seeing, how are they being resolved, a way to leverage information sharing.

Other common problems among parishes might be how to handle clergy compensation, taxation, health care, immigration issues, green cards. The UOL might/could assign issues/tasks under a commission for follow-up or a way to share information.

A third example, Sunday School/Vacation Bible School, issues/suggestions/ideas could be assigned under the UOL Education commission with discussions and shared across the UOC of USA.

In order to help the UOL grow and move forward, showing the value of the UOL as an organization to the entire UOC of USA to gain membership, momentum, fellowship, and break down barriers is a must. Moving the UOL to build bridges using various forms of Zoom type calls, meetings, conferences, in person meetings/conferences and publications. Suggesting projects and ideas seems to work well and should continue and be expanded along with the UOL becoming a point of contact for events and functions for parishes in order to share.

Focus on Youth

1. Christ Centered Parishes

Show respect by leading as examples that promote youth to be:

UOL Members, attend conventions, retreats, and spiritual events.

This is the foundation of family and Church to promote networking and growth of our UOC of USA.

2. Let youth take charge of events. Not as helpers, but as leaders.

3. Acquire good and meaningful teaching literature, relevant to the Ukrainian Orthodox Church, for church school students so they have a strong understanding of Orthodoxy.

Have regular teaching liturgies, maybe on a Saturday, so they understand every aspect of the Liturgy.

Have little kits available for the young children to occupy them during Liturgy. Fill them with liturgical items, if possible, to enhance liturgical understanding.

4. Teenagers

Teenagers need to be included in Sr. UOL Meetings and we need to understand what they need to feel included.

Some teenagers report that they feel they are being judged and it makes them uncomfortable.

We as adults need to work on changing our attitude.

Teenagers need a loving, accepting environment.

Very Rev. Protopresbyter Stephen Hallick-Holutiak Senior UOL Recognition Award Presented to Ruslana Korotinsky Submitted by Karen Ferraro

The Very Reverend Protopresbyter Stephen Hallick-Holutiak Senior Recognition award is given to a UOL member who demonstrates outstanding contributions to the League. At our 75th UOL Convention in Carnegie, PA, the Stephen Hallick-Holutiak / Senior Recognition Award was presented to **Ruslana Korotinsky** from St. Vladimir's Philadelphia Chapter.

Ruslana has been the driving force in providing humanitarian aid to Ukraine and organizing items to give to refugee families coming to Philadelphia. St. Vladimir's Hope Fund is their charitable giving committee with three focus areas: Local community in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Ukrainian Community Outreach, and Outreach to Ukraine.

Ruslana is the chair of the Philadelphia Ukrainian Community Outreach, but once the team decided to focus first on Outreach to Ukraine, she became co-chair of that focus area. One project worked on prior to the war involved sending funds to help the widow of a soldier fix up her dilapidated apartment, where she lived with her 7-year-old daughter.

Once war broke out, Ruslana stressed help must be swift and impactful. She has pushed hard on a daily basis to get medical supplies donated and shipped to where they are needed near the front lines in Ukraine. She and her family spent countless hours sorting and packing over 220 boxes of materials to be shipped. These boxes included medicine, baby food, socks, and other donated items. She organized a project to have people donate water purifying pills that was very successful. She had donations dropped off at her door daily and made several trips to church each week to sort and pack items. Even an emergency appendectomy didn't slow down her efforts!

Congratulations to Ruslana on receiving this well-deserved recognition! Many years!



Spiritual Advisor - Fr. Mykola Zomchak

Fr. Mykola Zomchak was born on May 22, 1995, in the little village of Stankova, Ivano-Frankivsk region, Ukraine. There he was brought up and went to school. In his home church, the Holy Archangel Michael, he became an altar server. After graduating from high school he entered Kalush Politech College where he studied Finance, later he continued to study Finance at the Institute of Management in Ivano Frankivsk where he received his Bachelor's Degree in Finance in the year of 2015. The same year he enrolled in St. Sophia Ukrainian Orthodox Theological Seminary in South Bound Brook, NJ. In the year of 2016, on the feast of St. Greatmartyr Panteleimon, he was tonsured a Subdeacon by Archbishop Daniel at St. Panteleimon Parish in Brooklyn NY. In December of 2019 Sbd. Mykola graduated from St. Sophia Ukrainian Orthodox Theological Seminary and received a Diploma with the Degree "Master of Divinity."

In the year of 2020, he married his wife Maria and in the year of 2021 on March 6 Sbd. Mykola was ordained a deacon by His Eminence Archbishop Daniel. On July 17 2021 Dn. Mykola was ordained a priest at the St. Andrew Memorial Church, South Bound Brook, NJ. Fr. Mykola worked at the Consistory of the UOC of USA until, on March 27, 2022, he was assigned to Sts. Peter and Paul Parish in Youngstown, OH, where he currently is the Pastor.

At the 75th UOL Convention Fr. Mykola was assigned by Metropolitan Antony as Spiritual Advisor of the Senior League. Prior to the 75th UOL Convention Fr. Mykola attended the UOL Conventions still as a seminarian. All those years he received the scholarship from the UOL to continue his studies. It was at the time when he was a seminarian that the Saint Sophia Seminary established their UOL Chapter where he served different positions as an officer. Fr. Mykola has participated in various mission trips. He has also served as a Spiritual Father of the Camping Program at the All Saints Camp.

The next morning sessions resumed with review of financial reports, annual reports from board members as well as a presentation from each of the break out committees. President Ferraro presented a check for "Souper Bowl Sunday" to Protodeacon Ihor Mahlay, President of St. Andrew's Society. This year the UOL raised \$8,575 for Souper Bowl Sunday. Accepting the donation, Protodeacon Ihor spoke of the common ministry of both organizations and the great part the UOL has played in helping St. Andrew's Society to raise and distribute about \$1,300,000 for charitable projects in the past 25 years of St. Andrew's Society's ministry.

Unfortunately Josh Oryhon was not able to join the Convention in person, however, with the help of technology he was able to greet the Convention participants and give them a tour of the new water treatment system. He also encouraged all members to support fundraising for All Saints Camp and specifically to donate to cover the expenses related to the installation of the new well and water system.

On Friday afternoon Convention delegates and guests had the opportunity to participate in a workshop, take some time to relax or to tour areas within Pittsburgh. The workshop was led by Tracy Sally, master pysanka writer. Tracy instructed members in making etched pysanky. The technique utilizes brown eggs and a method to etch the coloring off of the egg. Tracy outlined each step and taught the group how to etch the egg. Each member went home with their own supplies and egg.

Friday evening, traditionally cultural night at the UOL Convention, was a Ukrainian Christmas in July, chaired by Matushka Laryssa Charest. UOL members gathered at Cefalo's Banquet and Event Center. The local hall was



decorated with Christmas trees and zhvyzdas (stars carried by carolers). The night started with time to relax and chat and enjoy hors d'oeuvres. The entire group moved over to the next room for dinner, a delicious buffet. Following



dinner the group enjoyed a fun game of pirate Pollyanna, where members can pirate a gift from another at the table. It was a fun way to joke and laugh.

The group returned to the other room and enjoyed a moving adaptation of the Ukrainian Spider story that was created by Natalie Kapeluck Nixon and performed by the Kyiv Ukrainian Dance Ensemble of Carnegie, PA. Natalie narrated the story about how spiders had provided a gift to a poor family. As an additional surprise to the members, each member was given a spider Christmas ornament that was handmade by Christine Charest. The day ended with evening prayers.



This year Convention delegates were treated to a full breakfast provided at the hotel each morning. Saturday morning began with the Akathist Service. Saturday sessions started with review of the UOL Budget for the coming year. Junior Committees also presented their reports to the Convention body.

The Senior National UOL Board presented the UOL Essay Contest Awards. Teresa Linck, Essay Contest Chairperson, reported that this year there were 109 entries from 9 parishes for the UOL Essay Contest. A full list of all of the winners will be published in the next issue of the UOL Bulletin.

A highlight of the Convention is always Chapter Challenge and this year our Chapter Challenge was quite exciting. His Eminence Metropolitan Antony read the questions and the competition was close. The Chapter Challenge was a nail-biter with the Junior UOL National Executive Board losing.

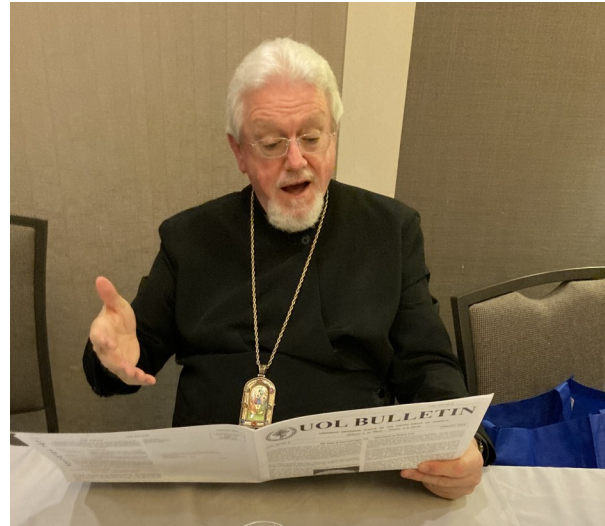

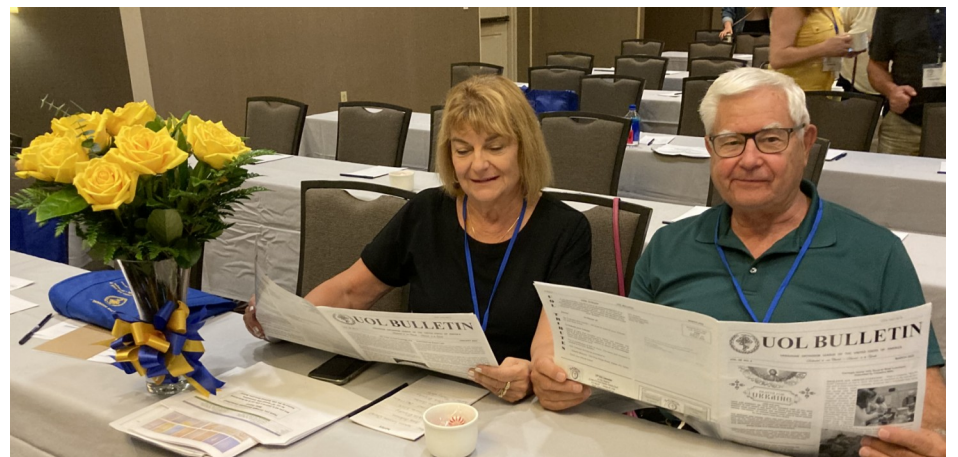

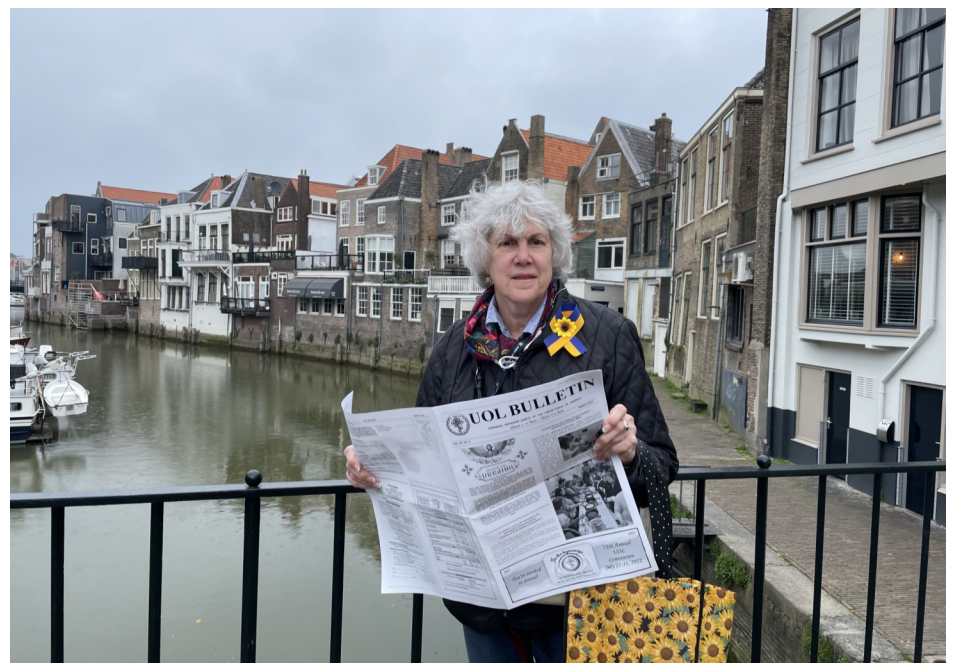
